

nitiated by the state Legislature in 1983, Maine's Two-Year Kindergarten Program allows all 4-year-olds in the state to enter the public schools. However, school districts are not mandated to provide kindergarten to 4-year-olds and are only partially reimbursed for it, so the program has remained small. Over the past several years, though, the program has doubled in size with the encouragement of the State Department of Education. As there are no income requirements or other risk factors tied to eligibility, access depends upon the willingness of individual school districts to provide the program. Districts providing prekindergarten are reimbursed through the state aid formula based on the average daily attendance. Prekindergarten programs are all offered within public schools, and schools cannot contract with outside agencies to provide services.


The state continues to encourage districts to develop programs for 4-year-old children, and provided \$5.9 million in combined state and local funds during 2003-2004 to serve an estimated minimum of 1,440 children.

In addition to funding for the Two-Year Kindergarten Program, Maine also provided \$3,581,018 through a combination of state money and tobacco funds to supplement federal Head Start funding during fiscal year 2003.
